Video Game Guinea Pigs at Play (*New York Times*, Aug. 18, 2014)

In an on-demand world obsessed with the pleasures of now, there's an even more immediate way to play many video games: while they're still being made. That's how I and 4,638,936 other people played *Destiny*, a highly anticipated alien-shooting game, scheduled for release next month. I tried it — at no charge — in July, when Activision gave PlayStation and Xbox gamers a couple of weeks of access ostensibly to test the game online. During this *Destiny* beta, players were confined to running through a virtual Russia and, on one day, to visiting the moon. Those who logged in were warned that the game might crash, which it did. And many were disconnected hours before the beta period was to end, only to learn via Twitter that they could — that they should — keep playing. So many titles in development are available early that players could stop waiting for finished games altogether. To understand the appeal, you would need to delight in reading rough drafts of books or be excited to don a hard hat and walk into a half-constructed building. The idea that there even is such a thing as a finished game might be an anachronism, given how frequently they are patched and updated after release. On PCs, the phenomenally successful independent game *Minecraft* became a hit several years ago when its creator started selling it, unfinished, months before its official release. *Battlefield: Hardline*, a game from EA, won't be out until next year, though it, too, has already had a public beta run. [...]

'The Wizard of Oz' Dazzled Audiences 75 Years Ago Today (Newsweek, Aug. 8, 2014)

Whimsical classic *The Wizard of Oz* premiered 75 years ago Saturday at Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood, where thousands of fans lined the streets hoping for a glimpse of Judy Garland or Toto the dog. The musical comedy instantly dazzled audiences with its singular score, sparkling ruby slippers and flying monkey antics. An adaptation of L. Frank Baum's 1889 story, the movie became a cultural staple; [...] With the notable exception of Walt Disney's *Snow White*, Hollywood's attempts to snare the mood of fantasies and fairy stories have been indifferently rewarded. Perhaps the fact that the Disney cartoon will eventually gross at least \$7,500,000 – an all-time screen record – encouraged Metro Goldwyn-Mayer to risk approximately \$3,000,000 on a flesh-and-blood re-creation of another famous children's story. [...] The screen version by Noel Langley, Florence Ryerson, and Edgar Allan Woolf treads closely enough in the footprints of Dorothy's magic slippers as she follows the yellow brick road to the Emerald City, but its whimsy has been broadened by antics after the musical-comedy manner and the interpolation of patter songs in Herbert Slothart's excellent score. [...] Produced by Mervyn LeRoy and directed by Victor Fleming, *The Wizard of Oz* was two busy years in the making. Magnificent sets and costumes, vivid Technicolor, and every resource of trick photography – including a realistically contrived cyclone – bolster the competent cast that strikes a happy medium between humor and make-believe. The more fanatic Ozophiles may dispute M-G-M's remodeling of the story, but the average movie-goer – adult or adolescent – will find it novel and richly satisfying to the eye. [...]

Will Fine Dining Start Asking for the Money Up Front? (Newsweek, Aug. 16, 2014)

Is there any other simple transaction that has so many opportunities for deception as making a restaurant reservation? [...] The restaurant business is one where everyone lies to each other – the receptionist might say they have a table waiting for you at 7.45pm, while knowing full well you won't be seated until 8.30pm. This means you will have to loiter at the bar and spend another £50 or more on a round of drinks. Meanwhile, when other clients turn up for a table for four, the restaurant is told that actually the other couple's babysitter was ill, but they would still like that spacious table just for themselves. One couple I knew were so notorious in the trade for pulling this trick, they passed into folklore – a "Scott Three" became code for anybody blagging a larger table for two. The losses suffered by restaurants through cancellations or no shows are, however, no laughing matter [...] so it is no surprise that some smart people are trying to devise a solution to this problem. One method is to introduce a no reservations policy; customers simply turn up and hope there will be space for them. This works well for casual places in busy locations [...] but is hardly appropriate for a haute cuisine establishment that has to spend considerable amounts of money on highly perishable produce. [...] In June, a new system was launched in New York called Resy, which offers customers premium tables at sought-after restaurants for a fee ranging from \$10 to \$25. There are also scalping sites that book tables under fictional names and then resell them. However, somebody has thought of a simple but ingenious way to not only make advance reservations, but also allow restaurants to virtually eliminate no shows and gain cash flow – sell a ticket. [...] customers would purchase a ticket for a seat and pay up front, just the same as anybody attending a concert or booking a flight on an airline. [...] This system is so new it still doesn't have a brand name, but [...] they expect to launch in the next few months. [...] The biggest early-adopter in the USA is Daniel Patterson [...] He has reduced prices for less busy times by 10% because of the savings on no-shows as the system allows restaurateurs to offer different prices for either high-demand times like Saturday evening or lower ones for, say, Monday nights. [...]

How we made The War Poetry of Wilfred Owen app for iPad (theguardian.com, 29th Aug., 2014)

The concept for an app based on the war poetry of Wilfred Owen came as the result of reading a very early e-book containing a collection of his work. While I appreciated the portability of an e-book, I felt that such powerful and moving words could be so much better delivered if more use was made of the interactivity offered by devices such as iPads. Owen's words didn't read like the poetry to which I'd previously been exposed. To me they provided vivid eye-witness reports from the frontline and described the horrors faced by the ordinary British soldier. As I read them, I heard them being spoken by a woman, a maternal figure, and this triggered a creative string of events. Outlining my basic ideas to my faculty at Anglia Ruskin University and a leading expert in this field at Girton College resulted in positive encouragement and offers of support. There was no going back. The main concept of The War Poetry of Wilfred Owen app was to provide interactive access to the poems, both written and audio. [...] Then followed two further ideas: the reader might also be interested in finding out more about the work, so why not include academic commentary and an illustration relevant to each poem? This way the reader would be drawn into a rich and informative experience. [...] Using a female voice for the poems upset the traditionalists. Some said that "it must be voiced by a young man" while a large majority found it a unique and stimulating perspective. The approach was to assume the position of a soldier, not necessarily Owen, writing words both descriptive and artistic which he then sent home. In all likelihood the first person to open and read a letter recognisable as being from the front would be a mother or wife. The words would provide a glimpse into both the physical experience and of the soldier's state of mind. It was never the intention to try and represent Owen and his situation but rather use his words to conjure up the assumed setting. During the many hours of recording, all who took part voiced similar feelings of emotion, [...]
